## **Allergic Reactions to Insect Stings**

Insect stings result in poisons and toxins being injected into the body. Naturally, the body (the immune system, specifically) will react to a sting. Someone may not have a severe allergic reaction the first time they are stung, but it is important to remember that *allergic reactions can get worse with each sting*. What this means is that someone's next reaction may be more severe than the last one and could even be deadly.

#### Mild and/or Large Local Reactions<sup>1</sup>

- Redness, pain and swelling around the sting.
- Itching around the sting or somewhere else on your body.
- Large, local reactions may take up to 10 days to go away.
- **Treatment may include** using ice to reduce swelling around the sting, over-the-counter pain relievers and antihistamines.

#### Severe Reactions<sup>1,2</sup>

- Hives (raised, red, itchy bumps that can be different sizes and shapes but will have red edges with pale centres).
- Nausea, vomiting, diarrhea.
- Anaphylaxis is life threatening and requires emergency treatment. It can cause breathing difficulties and confusion, among other symptoms:
  - o Shock, loss of consciousness or cardiac arrest.
  - o Swelling of tongue, throat, eyes, eyelids.
  - o Wheezing.
  - o Dizziness or sharp drop in blood pressure.
- **Treatment may include** an epinephrine shot in the thigh (prescribed by physician for someone with a known severe allergy), oral antihistamines and even emergency medical treatment (calling 9-1-1 or going to the nearest emergency room).

## Anaphylaxis

Symptoms of anaphylaxis can appear immediately or up to 30 minutes later. When someone does die of a severe allergic reaction, half will die within 30 minutes and three-quarters will die within 45 minutes of receiving the sting.<sup>2</sup>
